How Can We Measure Spiritual Progress?

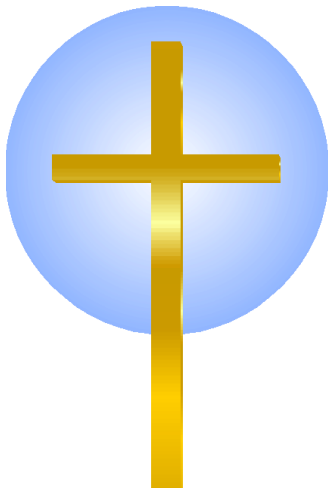

Every book contract—at least, every book contract I’ve ever seen—includes a word count. When the author finally submits a manuscript, it cannot be a discretionary number of words but must be within the range the publisher has set. This is good and helpful for an author because it makes it simple to set goals and because it helps him progress toward a very measurable outcome. After he signs his contract, he needs only to divide the words by the number of weeks before his deadline to keep up steady progress. As he writes, he needs only to look at the bottom of his screen to see how that word count is increasing. It’s easy, it’s clear, it’s objective. If only all progress were so easy to measure.

Each of us begins the Christian life a novice and each of us means to finish it a seasoned veteran. Each of us begins with character that has been shaped by the world and the flesh and each of us longs to finish with character that has been shaped by the Spirit and the Word. Each of us begins with warped desires and means to finish with true desires, with sinful instincts and means to finish with pure instincts. Each of us longs to make consistent progress.

But what may be true of writing a book is not true of living the Christian life. There is no progress indicator on our spiritual lives, no objective measure of our sanctification. A woman laying a floor can stand back and observe that she has laid 50 percent of the planks; a man finishing a basement can observe that 80 percent of the drywall has now been hung. But no Christian can assess his or her life and say, “I am halfway there” or “I am three quarters of the way there.” We make progress that is far less visible and far less measurable. This being the case, we must rely on other indicators.

One way to assess our progress is to think back and consider who we once were. Caution is in order, though, as we must avoid the tendency to relish our sinfulness or to make light of our depravity. Sometimes we can almost cast a wistful eye on the past, longing for the days when we were free to follow our lusts. Looking back at our former selves and our former conduct should be painful more than alluring. Yet sometimes we best see who we have become when we contrast it to who we used to be.

Another way to assess our progress is to observe how we have come to respond differently to temptation. We will inevitably see that, while temptations still remain, many of them no longer have as great a hold on us. What used to entrap us every time now barely elicits a response. We will also see that, while sin remains, we fall into it far less often and repent of it far sooner. This is proof of the sanctifying work of God within.

Still another way is to ask those who know us—friends, spouses, children—to describe evidences of God’s grace, to tell us where they have seen God actively helping us put sin to death and come alive to righteousness. Often we are surprised and delighted to know that where we are convinced of so much failure, they may see great success. Sometimes another person’s assessment is more accurate than our own.

Yet always and forever, the best way to assess ourselves is to compare ourselves to Jesus, the one who led a perfect and unblemished life, the one who modeled what a human life can be and should be. Such comparison should both distress and encourage. It should distress us to see how unlike Christ we still are. But it should encourage us to see that we truly have grown in Christlikeness, that as we spend time with him we have become like him. It should encourage us to see that we truly are being conformed to his image, truly are modeling ourselves after his example. This comparison is the best and truest of all.

At this point in writing, this article is exactly 705 words long—progress easily measured by the little counter on my screen. And at this point in life, I myself am somewhere between justification and glorification, somewhere in the long process of sanctification. I may not know exactly how much progress I have made, but by God’s grace I know I am farther along than I once was. And, by God’s grace, I know that by tomorrow I will be farther along than I am right now. For I know and believe the great promise that the one who began his good work within me will bring it progressively and then finally to completion.

In Matthew 22:34-40, Matthew writes the following: Hearing that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, the Pharisees got together. One of them, an expert in the law, tested him with this question. “Teacher, which is the greatest commandment in the Law?” Jesus replied: “Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it: ‘Love your neighbor as yourself.’ All of the Law and the Prophets hang on these two commandments.”

Love God? What does that mean? I think it means to obey his commands and to try to live life like Jesus.

The second command is simple, just love your neighbor as yourself. That is very simple, but not easy. Who is our neighbor? Everyone is your neighbor. All the people all over the world, those that go to church and everyone that doesn't. One of the ways we show that we love others is to be kind to them. It is easy to be kind to people we like, but we are supposed to love everyone including the people we don't care for very much.

I just finished reading *Autopsy of a Deceased Church* by Thom Rainer. The author looks at the similarities between fourteen churches which are no longer operational. One of the reasons that were similar was, the churches became inwardly focused instead of outwardly focused. We are fortunate that our church is all about outreach! But there are others in the community around us that need the love of a church and the church family.

Ask yourself, “What do I personally do to love others?” “Who does my heart break for?” “Is my church reaching them?”

If your heart is breaking for a certain section of the population, be a leader and come up with ways to minister to that group. Don't wait for the pastors to come up with ideas. Outreach tends to work better if the person in charge of the ministry is passionate about it. My challenge for you is to help our church figure out new ways to reach out and love our neighbors!

Recurring Giving

Hopefully, everyone knows that you can tithe to the church electronically through our website, our app, or the QRL codes around the church. Electronic giving is beneficial to the church because the tithes are deposited straight into our checking account. When you give electronically, you have two options: 1) make a one-time gift or 2) set up recurring giving. Why should we use recurring giving? For the tither, it allows you to set up regular donations to the church (depending on how you receive your income: monthly, weekly every two weeks, or on the 15th and the 30th). It is a convenient option for you, you don't have to get cash for church, bring your checkbook or even schedule another donation online. You can also cancel at any time. For the church, recurring giving helps us with budgeting by projecting a portion of what we will receive through electronic giving. We currently have 48 members/families that give through recurring giving today. Consider setting your giving up on a recurring basis.

FCCB Meeting Summary – Body of Trustees

Meeting Minutes / Wednesday, May 18, 2022

Present: Bob Meador, Scott Kelly, Mike Snyder, Carolyn Jones, David MacInnes, Nathan Loewen, Lead Pastor;
Mike Amos, Exec Pastor; John Jolly, Church Treasurer

Meeting called to order at 10:00 am

Opening Prayer: Mike Snyder

Financial Report: John Jolly gave a general budget review. We have a \$24,000 surplus YTD and are generally in good shape.

Bob Meador gave a Building & Grounds update:

- a. Steve Brubaker is going to paint over the graffiti on the west side of the Fellowship Hall.
- b. Meador has the name of someone who can apply window film to the windows of the Choir Room and west side windows of the Fellowship Hall. He will follow-up on costs.
- c. Jones raised the question of blinds for the Youth House to assist in reducing utility costs. This is under review for future discussion.
- d. Lawn in the circle in front of the Sanctuary is dying. Apparently, this occurs every summer due to the moving/eliminating of a sprinkler head when the parking lot was enlarged. This is under review for a solution.

David MacInnes gave a banking update:

We only have a few vendors still paid via Auto Pay (VyStar writes and pays the vendor with a check of the same amount each month). Leslie is checking with Comcast (Youth House) and Turner Pest Control to see if they will move to a credit card payment. Neptune Lawn will not move to a credit card. No Mission Ministry payees have been given to MacInnes to set up on Auto Pay.

- a. Question was asked if VyStar will do ACH payments to our vendors. MacInnes will check with VyStar to see if this is a possibility and how much it would cost.

Scott Kelly gave an update on Legal Review of Facility Use agreements:

- a. Steve Rust, Atty has been out of town but will look at the Agreement and requested changes.
- b. Question was raised about having an attorney on retainer. Snyder will look into it.
- c. Young Life facility use is still "on hold".

Mike Snyder brought the following items to the Trustees for discussion/action:

- a. \$40,000 payment was made on the CFR loan. This was from funds disbursed from the loan but not used for construction.
- b. Discussion was held on the use of \$3000 received from Tim Young Construction as acknowledgment of the cosmetic issue with the 3rd Floor of the Youth House. This led to discussion of the use of Designated and Undesignated Memorial Funds. Motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to "Apply \$6693 of the \$7443 in Memorial Funds as a principal reduction of the CFR loan. The remaining \$750 for George Mills is designated to the East Lawn Platform. The \$6693 will be transferred and applied to the principal loan balance after Pastor Mike Amos sends letters to families explaining how the funds will be used." After further discussion it was moved, seconded, and approved unanimously to also "apply the \$3000 from Tim Young Construction to the CFR principal loan balance."
- c. Discussion of the Non-Financial Gift Policy and its addition to FCCB Policy and Procedure Manual. The Phrase "current and future" was added to read "All current and future plaques" in paragraph 4 of the latest draft. Motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to accept the "Non-Financial Gift Policy as of this date, and add it to FCCB's Policy and Procedure Manual".

New Business:

- Mike Amos informed the Trustees he had spoken to Don Peters about others counting money by Monday for faster deposit. Motion was made, seconded, and unanimously approved to "add to the Counting Policy to allow Executive Pastor as the only staff member allowed to count money."
- Mike Amos will be using Quick Books training to prepare and move accounting/bookkeeping back "in house".
- Scott Kelly will finish wiring the Youth House for network ports.

The Responsibility of Stewardship

God is our Master, and we are responsible to manage His affairs and possessions. Because we are His servants, all that we have is His. This explodes the popular misconception that we give God His percentage, and the rest is ours.

According to Scripture, we are accountable to God for everything. Whether we have much or little, our key responsibility as His stewards remains the same: faithfulness.

"Let a man regard us in this manner, as servants of Christ, and stewards of the mysteries of God. In this case, moreover, it is required of stewards that one be found trustworthy" (1 Cor. 4:1-2).

In the parable of the talents (*Matt. 25:14-30*), the amounts differed, but each slave was entrusted with something.

The rewards were not based on how much they were given, but on what they did with what they were given. Significantly, the first two slaves were equally praised, though the first was given five talents and the second was given two.

We must resist the temptation to compare ourselves with others, because comparison is the basis of all dissatisfaction. All of us have been given something, and only one thing is important to God--faithfulness to what He has given us and called us to do (*Luke 12:42*).

Amazon Smiles

Amazon has a program called Amazon Smiles. You can google it and use your amazon login and password. Mission Moment

Love Packages is one of the ministries supported by your FCCB Missions Ministry. Mary Kessler, mom of Don Peters, planted the seed here at FCCB soon after she moved to Florida. She was our Paul. As we donate, collected materials, and send them to Love Packages, we are Apollos watering the seed. God makes it grow as Pastors and Sunday School teachers have materials to study and from which to teach. (1 Corinthians 3:6) We have been one of their ministry partners ever since.

Love Packages fuels international missions work, sending the gospel to the ends of the earth by putting donated Bibles and other Christian literature into the hands of people around the world. It began in 1975 when God spoke to the founder, showing him the abundance of Christian literature, he had at his disposal and the tremendous lack of literature in Third World countries. The first year he and his wife shipped sixty boxes of literature to missionaries in four countries. Subsequently, friends started bringing their excess literature. Before long they were receiving materials from all over the United States. The second year they shipped 3.5 tons, third year 7, fourth 11, and the snowball continued.

Since 1975 they have shipped over 15,000 tons of literature. Currently, 20-foot ocean going containers go to port cities around the world. These locations are distribution points to thousands of churches overseas. Their data shows that every piece of literature is read by an average of twenty people. Each container has at least a million pieces, so the potential is to reach 20 million people every time they send a container. **WOW!**

How can you be part of the process? Look for the collection box marked **LOVE PACKAGES** on the book table in the church foyer on the north side of the sanctuary.
