Worship with Your Family in 5, 15, or 30 Minutes

Worship defines our churches and our personal lives, and it should mark our homes. In fact, family worship has a long pedigree in the Protestant church. Along with corporate and private worship, it's considered one of the **regular routines of the Christian life**. And the benefits are eternal.

The Word and prayer are the means Christ employs to bless and minister to his people. As parents, we want to keep putting our children (and ourselves) in the way of Christ by engaging in his means of grace. Without some regularity, structure, and purpose, we often assume we're encouraging our children in Christ more than we actually are. Structured family worship seeks to daily encounter Christ by these means of grace—together.

Shape of Family Worship

There are many reasons why **family worship is important**. And thankfully, it's not hard! Finish dinner, clear the table, move to the family room, open the Bible, read a short section, and pray. Keep it brief. It doesn't have to be intimidating, it doesn't have to be difficult. In fact, it shouldn't be.

Here are some suggestions for what your family worship time could look like depending on how much time you have available.

5 Minutes: Prayer

If it's been a trying night and time is limited, simply gather your family together and pray for five minutes. Ask everyone to share one thing they were thankful for in the day or one request they'd like another to pray for them. And then pray. Even five minutes before the throne of God matters. Time in prayer is never wasted.

Now, this isn't ideal for a regular routine. But something is better than nothing. There are some nights when five minutes is all we have in the way of energy, patience, or time. That's fine. Remember, this is a means of grace, not a burden. Seize the moment, enjoy it, and make the most of those five minutes.

10–15 Minutes: Prayer, Word, Song

From my experience as a father, husband, and pastor, this time frame is ideal. Family worship doesn't need to be long to be effective. Most families will find that 10 to 15 minutes emerges as a sweet spot.

If your children are young, consider reading a short account from a narrative portion of Scripture for five minutes, praying for a few minutes, and daring to sing for two minutes. Narratives connect with children—they love stories. Use that to your family's advantage. Ask each person to request one thing for prayer and have the person on their right or left pray. Even a 2-year-old can pray that Mommy would "love Jesus more and more."

Finish with singing. It can be intimidating, but once **a family begins to sing together** they'll always sing together. When children are young, "Jesus Loves Me" and "The B-I-B-L-E" will be favorites. Mix in "The Doxology" or "Amazing Grace." As your family grows in age and experience, you can extend your repertoire.

15–20 Minutes: Prayer, Word, Discussion, Song

If your family is a little more seasoned, both in age and in the experience of family worship, you can attempt 15 to 20 minutes in family worship. This extended time allows for more elements and interaction. Work your way over the course of weeks and months through a book of the Bible. Read consecutive passages but always with the aim of understanding the overall message and delighting in Christ together.

Some of the extra time can be used to ask questions about the passage read that night. Ask age-appropriate questions and allow discussion to happen. Afford your children the opportunity to ask questions as well. Be assured, you don't need to have all the answers. In fact, it's refreshing for children when their father or mother says, "I'm not sure how to answer that, but I'll take time to study it and report back." Your children will benefit from knowing you take their questions seriously.

Consider adding different types of prayers to make your family worship time more robust. You could pray a prayer of adoration, confession of sin, confession of faith, thanksgiving, and various prayers of intercession. In our family, we often **select different countries** to pray for— each person prays for opportunities for the church and the gospel in that county.

20–30 Minutes: Prayer, Word, Discussion, Song, Memorization

Very few families should attempt 20 to 30 minutes in family worship on a regular basis. Consistency over time will pay more dividends than making family worship onerous by extending your family further than they can bear.

However, some families can and should aim for 20 to 30 minutes. If that's realistic for your family, consider adding memorization of Bible verses and a catechism to your regular family worship time. Memorizing the Word allows for meditation. And meditation upon the Word leads to being shaped by the Word. Memorization, meditation, and imitation is a natural flow in the Christian life.

Blessing also comes by taking the time to memorize a **catechism** (e.g., Westminster Shorter, Heidelberg, **New City**) together. This will add to your family's understanding of the Word and how to articulate it.

No practice in your home will prove more beneficial to your family than daily family worship. Christians worship; that's what we do. As a Christian family, that's what we want to do. Try it.

Mike's Musings

I was reading in Malachi chapter 1 recently. Malachi is an interesting book, as it is the last book in the Old Testament, and he is the last Old Testament Prophet except John the Baptist that we hear from in the Bible. In Malachi 1:6-7, the Lord says through Malachi, "A son honors his father, and a servant his master. But if I am a father, where is my honor? And if I am a master, where is your fear of me? Says the Lord of Armies to you priests, who despise my name. Yet you ask, "How have we despised your name?" "By Presenting defiled food on my alter." "How have we defiled you?" you ask. When you say: "The Lord's table is contemptible."

The verse goes on to explain that the priests of Israel were offering sacrifices with blemishes. Some were blind and some were lame. All the way back in Exodus, God tells Moses that they were to bring the best of the firstfruits. But if I am a father, where is my honor? They had lost their fear of the Lord. They were taking Him for granted. They were just going through the motions and definitely not in a way that honored God. He is talking to the priest of Israel, but with the sacrifice of Christ, all believers are priests. Here is what I ended up asking myself after reading this chapter: Do I give God my best? My firstfruits? Or do I give him the leftovers? When I pray or read the Bible, am I focused on God or on the world around me? Do I spend time with God to check the box that I fulfilled that requirement today or do I earnestly want to spend time with Him and get to know Him better? Do I honor God with my actions, or do I defile Him? Do I hold Him with reverence and awe, or do I take him for granted?

I encourage you to read Malachi. It is short only 4 chapters. Spend some time thinking about how you treat our God, who is the creator of everything, provider of everything and really everything to us. Set some goals to help you honor God more and work on giving God your best. I know that I am!

Hurricane Ian Relief

Elder's Corner

THANKSGIVING

The protestant reformation began in Germany in 1517 and reached England 17 years later, in 1534. The Puritans were Church of England reformers, but the Pilgrims were Separatists who broke completely with the Church of England.

The Pilgrims believed the break with Rome was not complete enough. Persecuted in England, these Separatists migrated to Holland in 1608. Life was not good there either so twelve years later, in 1620, with the backing of a Virginia company, 102 souls sailed for America on the Mayflower. After a turbulent 65-day voyage, they arrived off the coast of Massachusetts on November 21, 1620.

Before disembarking they signed the Mayflower Compact, America's original document of civil government and the first to introduce self-government. It included an agreement to live in accordance with the Christian faith. The first winter was not too severe and the 53 survivors (49 had died mostly from disease) celebrated a good harvest with the Indians. While there was no mention of Thanksgiving, the Pilgrims did give thanks to God.

Two years later, in 1623, the harvest looked good but during the summer, the rain stopped. The Pilgrims held a day of humiliation and prayer, the rains came, and the harvest was saved. God had answered.

Governor William Bradford proclaimed (wrote down) November 29, 1623, as a day of Thanksgiving. The first Thanksgiving proclamation was 53 years later, June 20, 1676, by the governing council of Charlestown Massachusetts. They declared "...June 29 as a day of Thanksgiving, our first." The next year, 1777, the revolutionary Continental Congress issued a Thanksgiving proclamation. Soon after the adoption of the Bill of Rights in September 1789, a motion to initiate the proclamation of a National Day of Thanksgiving was approved and signed by George Washington.

As time progressed, some presidents proclaimed a day of Thanksgiving, others did not until Abraham Lincoln. Lincoln began the tradition of an annual day of Thanksgiving and proclaimed it the last Thursday of November in 1863. Thanksgiving remained the last Thursday in November for seventy-eight years until 1939 when President Roosevelt moved Thanksgiving Day to the fourth Thursday of November to give the merchants more time to prepare for Christmas.

This became law in 1941-interestingly, just before Pearl Harbor. Thanksgiving Day remains a special day in the United States. It is the day some of our first settlers thanked the God of the Bible for his watchful care and provision. Today we remember that same God who loves us unconditionally and blesses us every day. While the Pilgrims were thankful for the Indians during that first harvest, they were thankful to God for His blessings. The original documents, written by the Pilgrims, tell us their story.

Stewardship

STEWARDSHIP OF TREASURE

In addition to our resources of time and talent, we have been entrusted with the stewardship of various treasures including our bodies (Romans 12:1; 1 Corinthians 6:19-20), our minds (Romans 12:2; 1 Peter 1:13), and our opportunities (Colossians 4:5).

In the remainder of this message, we will focus on the treasure of our financial resources, since Scripture has so much to say about this basic concern that affects us all.

When it comes to governing our financial affairs, we must choose between two radically different approaches: the values of our society, or the values of the Bible.

The first alternative tells us to find happiness and peace through money; the second tells us to find the desire of our hearts in the Lord and to be content with what He gives us. Money is a good servant but a bad master--if we follow the world's wisdom, money will dominate us, but if we submit to "the wisdom from above" (James 3:17), money will serve us as we use it to serve God and others.

While the Bible has about 500 verses on prayer and fewer than 500 verses on faith, there are over 2,300 biblical verses that deal with money and possessions.

Without apology, our Lord said more about money than He did about any other subject, including heaven and hell put together. Over 10 percent of the New Testament relates directly to financial matters.

Why is there such an emphasis?

One reason is that God knew we would have trouble managing our money, and that we would spend a great amount of time earning, spending, and investing it.

A second reason is that money has a profound effect on interpersonal relationships. Many people spend more than half their time thinking about money, and financial difficulties are a major cause of marital conflict and divorce.

A third reason is that the way we use our money is a real measure of our commitment to Christ.

Scripture relates money to the love of God: "But whoever has the world's goods, and beholds his brother in need and closes his heart against him, how does the love of God abide in him?" (1 John 3:17).

We can assume an appearance of spirituality in prayer, Christian service, and Bible knowledge, but we cannot fake the way we use our money and possessions. Our wallet reveals more about our character and walk with the Lord than we may think.

Financial freedom should be a part of our new life in Christ, and the wise person seeks the timely practice of timeless principles in this vital area. We will look at the biblical guidelines concerning the proper attitudes toward money (ownership, priorities, contentment), and the proper actions with money (responsibilities, giving, borrowing, budgeting, saving, communicating).

First Christian Church of the Beaches, in coordination with Mission House and St. Pauls' by the Sea Episcopal, will provide overnight shelter and food for our beaches' homeless community on nights when local weather forecasts predict a temperature of 40°F or lower (including windchill) or 45°F with rain.

Starting in November 2022, our church will provide people-power and meal support to St. Paul's Episcopal in Jacksonville Beach. Although our church will NOT be used as a physical location for the shelter, we will provide communication leaders, greeters, evening shifts, morning shifts, and cleanup crews. Shifts will normally be 3 hours long.

Here's how it will work...

- Mission House will notify FCCB's Coordinator, Steve Fitzgerald, of the need.
- Steve will then notify our volunteer list.
- Our volunteers will be emailed a link to access a sign-up list, where they can choose from the various jobs and shifts.
- Steve can or will assist them in choosing and assigning shift positions.

There will ALWAYS be two experienced CNS support people on station during Cold Night operations. They will aid, oversee, train, and support the volunteers.

We are now compiling a list of volunteers to help some of the most vulnerable people living in our local area during the coldest nights of the year. Prayerfully consider if God is calling you to serve as a Cold Night Shelter Volunteer.

FCCB Meeting Summary – Body of Trustees

Meeting Minutes / Wednesday, October 19, 2022

Present: Bob Meador, Scott Kelly, Carolyn Jones, Mike Snyder, David MacInnes, Nathan Loewen, Mike Amos

Meeting called to order at 10:00am by Mike Snyder, Moderator

Opening Prayer: Nathan Loewen

Review of prior meeting minutes: Scott called the question of approval of September 21, 2022, minutes as presented. Motion passed unanimously.

Financial Report:

- Mike A. reported that giving was off \$16,000 in September.
- Mike also reported an Estate Gift of \$75,000 was received and moved \$104,500 be used to reduce the Youth House (DFR) loan balance. Bob seconded and motion was approved.
- Nathan moved making the Estate Gift available for repaying some of the CFR loan and said the Endowment Committee had approved the use of estate funds for this purpose. Bob seconded, and the motion was approved.
- Bob will assist Mike A. with getting appropriate staff as authorized users to sign into Vystar through QuickBooks.

Building & Grounds:

- Workday is Saturday, October 22, 8am-noon. The Boy Scouts have begun clearing the fence around East Lawn.
- Bob is looking into an Indemnity Handbook for contractors, as part of the Agreement they are required to sign.

Outdoor Worship Space:

- Contractor is moving forward with the project and looking at using a Field Permit to begin. He has the survey.
- The survey pipes placed during the survey are reference points and not boundary markers.

Insurance:

- We have full coverage for the Beach Barn (hazard and flood) for \$4000 annually. Also flood insurance has been added to the pre-existing property for \$300 per year. There was a typo in the address for flood insurance but has been corrected and full coverage is in place for all property.

Update from Mike Snyder:

- Budget is going to Leadership Council Oct. 20. Questions concerning the budget were discussed with no changes.
- Mike has identified his replacement as an outgoing Trustee. The name will be forwarded through the voting process.
- John M. has replaced the battery in the van and will post it for sale.

New Business:

- David reported we have 290,740 UChoose reward points through the VyStar Credit Card. This equates to approx. \$2700 in gift cards at various retail stores. Options were discussed.
- Carolyn moved a \$500 Lowes Gift Card be ordered for Bob to use for the Workday mulch and other items needed. Mike A. seconded, and the motion was approved.
- Mike S. will be out of town for the November meeting, but he will provide an agenda.
- Mike A. reported a new cleaning service, Majestic Cleaning will begin November 1. They charge \$400 less than current service and with more extensive duties. They will be on site Tuesdays and Fridays.
- A Boy Scout working on his Eagle Scout project will be installing a bike rack at the Youth House.
- There has been some concern that a marked police car has not been present on site during services, as a “visible” presence. Christy is now a detective and does not have a marked police car. Following discussion, it was agreed an unmarked car is acceptable, as long as the officer providing security is walking the property as a “visible” presence.

Moderator adjourned the meeting at 11:13am, with prayer by Scott Kelly.
