Sabbath Rest

Sabbath can be described as deliberate disengagement. We make a choice to leave our normal world to remind ourselves that Jesus is the Lord of our lives, our work, and our world. But a Sabbath is also deliberate engagement in the gifts and presence of God. During a Sabbath we observe God's control, work, mystery, grace, and favor by taking time to see them apart from our control, work, and drive. To experience a Sabbath, we plan and observe a day in which we watch God work, hear His voice, and realize His faithfulness.

CHOOSE AND PLAN A TIME

Life in our culture is so strenuous—filled with work, activities, meetings, and chores—that we're likely destroying ourselves if we don't take a full day without those responsibilities. That's one practical reason a twenty-four-hour period is strongly recommended for a Sabbath. This can be Sunday or another day. If this practice is new for you, it will require some planning. You'll have to set aside the day and adjust meetings and activities. You'll need to prepare for this day as a family. But you'll be rewarded by taking a physical stance against the frenzied pace that rules your life.

WHAT TO DO ON A SABBATH

There are three simple components of a Sabbath: inactivity, prayer, and enjoyment.

1. PURSUE TRUE INACTIVITY. Take time during the day to be still and practice silence and solitude. Mentally reflect on all God has done during the previous week and on the burdens you carry. Inactivity means you avoid filling the day with kids' practices, errands, and household chores.

2. ENGAGE IN PRAYER. Take time to read a psalm, reflect on it, and pray. Plan prayer times beforehand and make prayer a constant priority throughout the day. Family Sabbaths can also be great; share and pray about what you're thankful for at work, at school, and at home. Give thanks for who God is and what He has done.

3. DO THINGS YOU ENJOY. Sabbath is a sweet gift from a God who loves you. Consider ways you can do truly fun, enjoyable things. Go on a hike, swim, ski, paint, write, do woodworking, and eat good food, remembering that all of these activities are ways you can worship God. Avoid watching television, surfing the Internet, or devouring social media. You likely don't enjoy those things as much as you think.

At some point in your life, you have probably heard that you are a dirty sinner barely saved by grace. It is true that we are all sinners. It is also true that we can be saved by grace if we confess that Jesus is our Lord. However, I think barely is where the statement is untrue. Our focus tends to lie on the barely.

In John 3:14-16, Jesus tells us that "Just as Moses lifted up the snake in the wilderness, so the Son of Man must be lifted up, that everyone who believes may have eternal life in him. For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

Jesus doesn't say barely lifted up or shall not barely perish. God doesn't do things halfway. He always gives his best for us because he loves the world.

God created Adam and Eve in the garden. They sinned against God, which made everyone a sinner from then until Jesus came. The Jewish law that we read about in the Old Testament is a very rigorous set of rules to stay clean and to atone for sin. It was almost impossible to meet the requirements of the law. The Jewish law used animal sacrifices to atone for sin, but you kept having to sacrifice every time you sinned. The animal had to be perfect to be sacrificed to God.

Then God sent His only son to live life on the Earth. He lived a sinless life, which made him the ultimate sacrifice for us. Jesus dealt with temptations of all kinds and experienced all the stuff that we face. Accepting Jesus today washes away all of our sin from the past, present and the future. God's hand was in the whole process. God had planned this for all time. It isn't a barely action, but a deliberate action. Once you accept Christ, God sees you through the blood of Jesus, which makes you perfect. Just like the old hymn says, "What can wash away my sins? Nothing but the blood of Jesus."

Unlike the Jewish law, we don't have to do anything but believe in Jesus to have eternal life. It is a gift freely given because God loved the world so much. It was a loving, intentional, deliberate action on God's part. There is no barely about it!

Invitation

Did you know that studies show that only 10% of church goes ever invite people to church? When was the last time you invited somebody to church? We are fortunate to have three distinct services including our oceanfront outdoor service and the Wednesday night fellowship meals. Inviting people to church is a form of evangelism. With only 30% of the Beaches' population attend church, the harvest is ripe. We have business cards that have the service times, phone number, physical address, and website address that you can give folks when you invite them. I challenge you to connect with the people around you and invite them to church. You may have to ask more than once. Asking someone to church, could have eternal ramifications in a person's life. Ask and see what God can do!

Elder's Corner

July is the month in which we celebrate the founding of our country—"the land of the free and the home of the brave." The vast majority of Americans believe in what this country has stood for over 250 years. What our founders established--the Great Experiment in Democracy. A country based on ideas plainly stated in our founding documents that boldly pronounce that we are endowed by our Creator with the inalienable rights--life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

As we watch the news it is apparent that lots of people from all over the world are drawn to a nation that believes in the concept of freedom and individual liberty. And we do have lots of freedom here compared to so many other places in the world.

As I look around it seems that, yes, we do have lots of freedom. But...do we understand the challenge we have to practice that freedom in responsible ways. Several years ago, a senior pastor of this church, Mahlon Dixon, gave a sermon about freedom. He told the story of a teenager, who "exercising" her freedom, believed it was a "smart" thing to start smoking. She was of an age and believed it made her look "cool". As an added incentive, it would really make her parents unhappy. As years went by, the teenager became an adult and wished she could stop smoking--which she once thought made her look "cool", but now just made her look like she couldn't make very good decisions about her health.

Freedom confronts us with an interesting dilemma. When does, what seems to offer wonderful opportunities, become a devious trap? How do we know what "real" freedom is? And how can we use that freedom to improve our lives, the lives of ones we love, and the lives of those in our community?

As with questions such as these, going to the scriptures is a great place to look. And, as usual, God tells us how we should approach freedom.

As Paul writes in Galatians 5:13, " You, my brothers, and sisters, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the flesh; rather, serve one another humbly in love."

And Peter counsels in I Peter 2:16-17, " You are free, but still, you are God's servants, and you must not use your freedom as an excuse for doing wrong. Respect everyone and show special love for God's people. Honor God and respect the Government."

So, our real freedom comes from being a child of God and following his guidance. By respecting others, we will use our freedom to respect not denigrate, help not hurt, love not hate, and at all times, honor God.

FCCB Meeting Summary – Body of Trustees

Meeting Minutes / Monday, June 20, 2022

Present: Bob Meador, Scott Kelly, Mike Snyder, Carolyn Jones, John Jolly, Church Treasurer; Mike Amos, Exec Pastor

Meeting called to order, 10:00 am

Opening Prayer: Mike Amos

Financial Report: John Jolly gave a general budget review. We are generally in good shape; offerings have exceeded expenditures which has us in a cash surplus YTD.

Committee reviewed the minutes for the last meeting, they were unanimously approved.

Bob Meador gave a Building & Grounds update:

- a. Solar window film has been partially completed. The remainder of the job is in process.
- b. The VII Financial Policies of the Church and Appendix FP-3 Memorial Fund changes were reviewed discussed and approved. Scott Kelly moved to accept and Carolyn Popp seconded, it carried unanimously.

Carolyn Popp update:

- a. Carolyn gave a comprehensive review of property zoning and possible usage of the East Lawn in regard to construction of a platform. She recommended that the Board of Trustees determine what the church actually needs/wants concerning this platform. After determining the requirements and prior to construction, the following items will need to be completed:
 - a. A survey of the property.
 - b. An engineering construction plan.
 - c. A DEP (Department of Environmental Protections) permit.
 - d. A Neptune Beach building permit, which includes a review of the surrounding neighbors about the construction.
- b. The Trustees agreed:
 - a. The entire project should be planned vice trying to short cut the project to get something in place.
 - b. A committee should be set up to follow the construction process.
 - c. A determination should be made if members will be willing to support the debt required to complete the project, estimated costs: Survey and Engineering \$10K and construction cost \$40K.
- c. Carolyn has a blinds contractor coming in to review options for the Youth House. The emphasis is the reduction of utility costs. This project is under review for future discussion.
- d. Carolyn Popp requested information concerning the Pastor Appreciation line of marked donations, \$676.00. John Jolly said he would email the trustees with information concerning this line for later review and discussion.

Scott Kelly gave an update on Legal Review of Facility Use agreements:

- a. Steve Rust, Atty has been out of town, doubtful he will be available to review the Agreement and requested changes.
- b. Mike Snyder has forwarded Scott information about a Paralegal service. Scott will determine if this service will suffice in reviewing this form and any others requiring review.
- c. Young Life facility use is still "on hold".

Mike Snyder update:

- a. \$12,000 principal payment was made on the CFR loan, this is the 2nd payment toward principle on the loan.

New Business:

- CFR YOUTH HOUSE CONSTRUCTION LOAN:
 - Mike Amos is making changes to the Push Pay site that will clearly identify a line for the reduction of the CFR Youth House Debt.
 - Anyone using Push Pay will be able to contribute/offer cash donations to help the church reduce the CFR loan which was used to complete the Youth House construction.
