5 Things Failed New Year's Resolutions Teach Us

I used to have a tradition for New Year's resolutions. I would find some quiet time before New Year's Day—maybe when the kids were napping—and sit on the porch with my Bible and a journal. I would, in sequence, read Scripture, pray, and journal. At the end, I would write some resolutions for the year to come.

I recently flipped through some of my old journals, and the resolutions were pretty much the same each year, only with different wording or different color ink. Some were casual, like deadlifting X number of pounds. Others were more serious, like learning to serve my wife with joy instead of duty.

After writing my resolutions, I'd look at them in the coming days—never often. Most of the time, I forgot they existed. By June, they had evaporated from my mind.

I've failed at keeping most of my resolutions, and most of us have failed at keeping resolutions, whether they've been to pray more or lose 10 pounds. The University of Scranton did a study that showed only 8 percent of people keep their resolutions. Thus, it's wise to learn from these failures and reframe the way we think about meaningful life changes.

Here are five things our failed resolutions tell us.

1. We're unable to change ourselves.

Our wills are not strong. We can read all the self-help books we want, but growth in character and holiness are not DIY projects. In fact, self-help can be detrimental if we aren't careful.

Life change comes from heart change, and heart change comes from God.

2. We don't even know what we want.

So often in my resolutions I'd want something that became worthless to me months later. Our interests change, and as we grow in wisdom our desires elevate and mature. Even with wisdom we still see dimly, and if our goals alone charted the course of our lives, we'd end up lost. We need the Lord to guide our lives and desires.

3. We have an unhealthy and unrealistic interest in our earthly future.

In C. S. Lewis's *The Screwtape Letters*, the senior demon Screwtape tells Wormwood, his understudy:

We want a whole race perpetually in pursuit of the rainbow's end, never honest, nor kind, nor happy now, but always using as mere fuel wherewith to heap the altar of the future every real gift which is offered them in the Present.

Here's what Lewis was driving at: we are obsessed with the future and unsatisfied with the present. Really, we are obsessed with our *earthly* future. But our earthly future is merely an idea. The past has passed. And while we should plan for our future on earth, it's not guaranteed. Far better to seek contentment in the present and hope in our eternal future. These are guaranteed.

4. We're not content in every circumstance.

Our failed resolutions teach us that we're not happy with how God cares for us. We want more: more muscle, more money, more notoriety, more everything. True contentment in the grace and hope of Christ is not circumstantial; it flourishes in the dungeon as well as the mansion. We fail to comprehend our fortune because of what Jesus has accomplished for us, and we fail to appreciate the outrageous grace of merely being alive.

5. We need Jesus.

Our resolutions are often shallow, but even the deep ones and our failure to keep them shows a dire need for heart change. We're not what we should be, and we want to be different. The transformation we seek is valid, but the means by which we seek it are often insufficient. We need Jesus to transform us into his likeness and resolve alone isn't enough.

Not Bad, but Often Ineffective

Resolutions aren't entirely bad. It is by no means sinful to make New Year's resolutions. Jonathan Edwards famously made them. So did T. S. Eliot, Ralph Waldo Emerson, and J. R. R. Tolkien. Resolutions aren't wrong, but they're not usually effective.

My kids once made a treasure map of our back yard. They drew crossing dotted lines and an X, which marked the spot of reward. It was cute, but the map was useless. There was no treasure, and their map was inaccurate. Too often, this is us. We tend to chart a childish course for our lives and pursue treasures that don't exist.

The apostle James potently evaluates our attempts to manipulate the future:

Come now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go into such and such a town and spend a year there and trade and make a profit"—yet you do not know what tomorrow will bring. What is your life? For you are a mist that appears for a little time and then vanishes. Instead, you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we will live and do this or that." ([James 4:13–15](#))

How to Make Resolutions

Okay, so it's clear that resolutions are often short-sighted and ineffective. But what about those of us who like to make them? Here are some recommendations:

- Make sure your resolutions align with God's Word and with God's aim to glorify himself by magnifying your joy in him.
- Set realistic resolutions that are SMART: Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Timely.
- Seek counsel, and accountability, from brothers and sisters in Christ.
- Pray over your resolutions and submit them to the Lord for his guidance.

Whether or not you set resolutions for 2019, don't place your hope in your ability to change yourself. If we could change ourselves, Jesus wouldn't have had to come. Only he can transform us. Resolve this year to praise him for what he has done and seek to become more like him by this time next year.

Elder's Corner

How then shall we live? Pursuing Life's Three Great Priorities

This Elder's Corner is adapted from our current Wednesday night Bible Study by Dr. John MacArthur of 1 Peter 1:13-25 to 2:3. Peter is sharing with other exiled Christians in Asia, how they should live, and how to prioritize their daily walk.

It seems fitting that as we start 2022 and continue to face all the extra challenges of the last couple of years, that we listen to Peter's words to the faithful to simplify our own walk as the Body of Christ in this new year.

The greatest gift ever given is the gift of salvation in Christ, and the greatness of that gift demands from us the greatest responses. First is our response to God, second is our response to others, and third, is our response to ourselves. These are the Christian Life's Three Greatest Priorities.

First, we are to respond to God, with hope, holiness, and honor, because we were redeemed not by perishable things, but by the Blood of Christ. Our response to God is because of the price God has paid for our redemption. Hope is the same substance as faith...it is believing in God, trusting God. Faith believes what God has said and done. Hope believes God for what He has promised yet to do.

Our second response is to fervently love one another, that is a love that supernaturally belongs to believers, because "the Truth purified our souls" at the moment of our salvation. When we were saved, we were given a new family to love, the Body of Christ, the Body of all believers. God washed us, justified us, and is still sanctifying us in our daily walk, until we are glorified with Him in heaven. We love one another because He first loved us. Loving God, loving Christ, loving one another are all tied together.

Our third response is to desire...to crave...the Word of God. The Word is a spiritual, inexhaustible, inextinguishable life source, having the power to transform our lives. It is the greatest power we possess. Peter's point is, since this living and abiding eternal Word of God was the power that transformed your life, saved you by God's grace by the Imperishable Seed that gave you life, since the Word is your life source, and the power of your new existence, therefore, long for it, desire it. If it transformed you in the beginning, it will keep on transforming you.

My prayer for us all, "Lord, deliver us from ever being satisfied with where we are spiritually." You are all invited to join Wednesday night Bible study, starting on January 12th, as we continue to study 1 Peter.

COVID has taught us to find new ways to do old things. Due to many factors, we are able to resume hosting Cold Night Shelter in our Fellowship Hall on a rotating basis with other participating Beach churches. Safety precautions will be in place. A few have volunteered, but more are needed.

- ♥ Soup makers: recipes provided, make ahead of time and place in designated freezer at FCCB
- ♥ Communication leader: Alert volunteer team via phone or email of FCCB's turn to serve
 - List who is doing what and when
- ♥ Van driver and assistant: Evening and morning route to pick up and deliver attendees
- ♥ Greeters/registrars:
 - Evening shift**-Welcome and supervise sign-in of attendees
 - Pass out blankets
 - Morning shift**-Collect blankets
 - Distribute bag lunches as attendees leave
- ♥ Shoppers/gleaners: Obtain needed food items for night meal, bag lunches, and breakfast
- ♥ Kitchen helpers:
 - Evening shift**-Warm and serve soups on hand, clean up kitchen afterward
 - Night shift**- Prepare bag lunches for morning distribution
 - Morning shift**-Prepare and serve light breakfast, clean up kitchen afterward
- ♥ Nighttime hosts (4-hour shifts):
 - Supervise during the night-lights out call and enforcement
 - Supervise during the early morning-wakeup call, attendees out by 7AM
- ♥ Cleaning crew: Vacuum Fellowship Hall, clean bathrooms

December 15, 2021

Present: Mike Snyder, Pastor Nathan Loewen, Bob Meador, Kristin Jewell, Ed Washburn & Scott Kelly

Meeting called to order, 9:50am by Mike Snyder

Opening Prayer: Ed Washburn

Review of Prior Meeting Minutes: Approval by Kristin and seconded by Ed. All in favor, motion passed.

Financials:

- * John Jolly provided (in abstention) a full financial report ahead of the meeting. Everyone who were present agreed all was in order, as expected.

Buildings & Grounds:

- Ed reported that Carolyn Popp will continue his good work on our Building and Grounds when he comes off the Board of Trustees in Jan.

Banking/Payroll/Bills:

- Kristin has yet to contact David Macinnes about his stepping into her role on the Board of Trustees, but she will once he has been added to the Vystar accounts, making it more meaningful for him when going over the processes of the monthly banking duties.

Youth House:

- Bob reported that we still don't have a firm date for occupancy.

Chairman Update: Mike provided the following updates.

- The 2022 Annual Congregational Meeting Ballot was prepared and accepted.
- The 2022 Budget has been accepted and Staff raises have been communicated to Leslie to start in Jan.
- Our new Executive Pastor, Mike Amos will start on Jan 18, 2022. His Call Letter has been prepared and will be completed and signed this week.
- The next Trustee Meeting will be Jan 19 at 10am with the new members joining!
- A phone call was received concerning the church van operations. After determining there was no misuse, Mike asked if we felt like a two way dash cam would be useful (much like those used on school busses). Scott made a motion to purchase and install a two way dash cam and Ed seconded the motion, unanimous vote, so passed.

New Business:

- Pastor John Madison submitted a 2021 salary adjustment to include housing for Dec 2021 of \$3583.32.
- Pastor John's 2022 compensation package is presented as – Housing \$25,000 – Salary \$19,325 totaling \$44,325 and approved by unanimous vote.
- Pastor Nathan's compensation package is presented as – Pension \$13,500 – Housing \$52,205 – Salary \$35,000 and approved by unanimous vote.
- Our Auto and Liability coverages have been renewed.
